# **MINUTES**

# AGENDA MEETING MONDAY, June 10, 2013

At 7:02 P.M. on Monday, June 10, 2013 Chairman Vella called the meeting of the Bayshore Regional Sewerage Authority to order and makes the following announcement:

This notice is also posted in the lobby of the Bayshore Regional Sewerage Authority Administration Building.

Chairman Vella asks all in attendance to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance and a Moment of Silence for the safety of US Troops all over the world.

Charles Hoffman called for a "Point of Order" asking the Attorney, Jim Gorman, what transpired at the meeting he had not attended. Mr. Hoffman was told he could not speak until the Public Portion.

# Reports

#### BRSA Projects, Special Reports & Connection Applications

<u>Sludge Management Alternative Study- Gannet Fleming</u> - Mr. Fischer introduced Fletcher Platt and Rich Ulrich from Gannet Fleming who made a slide presentation (along with a written version) outlining the Sludge Disposal Alternatives.

<u>Disaster Recovery Update</u> – Mr. Fischer spoke about the recent FEMA Project Worksheet being submitted for additional funds with reimbursement in about 2 ½ months. He stated the FEMA employees are about to return home so they are anxious to wrap up as much paperwork as they could. He said thanks to R3M and Denise our detailed spreadsheets expedited the submission for the reimbursement.

Commissioner McMullen said there have been talks that FEMA is going to reimburse 90% instead of the 75%. How realistic do you think that is? Mr. Fischer said it's getting very close but it depends on the total cost of the damages.

#### Staff Engineer Report

Pete Canal introduced Jerry Mitchell from Arcadis, who presented the Commissioners with the Arcadis proposal to assist the BRSA with the FEMA process. He explained that to ensure FEMA reimbursement he suggested changing his earlier proposal from a time and material type contract to a lump sum not to exceed which is preferred by FEMA. He went on to discuss how Arcadis will perform their services, aided by R3M Engineering to arrive at the best mitigation alternative that will be presented to FEMA.

Pete asked Manuel Ponte to explain the bid for the Hauling & Disposal of the Dewatered Sludge Cake. Manuel said BRSA received 2 bids, 2 others decided not to bid. Russell Reid's bid was lower than Gary Gray's. He explained that Gary Gray is from South Jersey and has a longer trip to get here. However, Russell Reid said his trucks are not compatible with Stony Brook Sewerage Authority's unloading dock. Russell Reid expressed their approval to award the bid to the next lowest bidder instead of them. The Commissioner's & Attorney recommend award of the bid to Russell Reid and if there is a problem, pull their Bid Bond. Manuel Ponte explained that Russell Reid will live up to the bid if it is awarded to them and they will modify their trucks and order new 30 yard containers that will work at Stony Brook.

#### Consulting Engineer Report

#### Plant Structure Assessment & Mitigation Concepts

Manuel Ponte handed out his report reviewing the Sandy flood levels and what it means to the plant. He explained the maximum level of flooding that each building could withstand as-is without additional structural improvements this elevation serves as the baseline for mitigation alternatives.

#### **BRSA Superintendent's Report**

Mike Broyles said he spoke to Stony Brook. BRSA is sending SBRSA 30 yd. containers that are not exactly 30 yds. in sludge volume. SBRSA agreed to bull each dumpster at 26 yds. For May it was a \$10,000 savings. Mike said he received 4 odor complaints, 2 the same day, doing our best to keep odors at a minimum.

Mike reported that due to an oversight we missed a required oil & grease sample. Being the monitoring period ended, we cannot make-up the sample.

Mike reported on the preparation for the current tropical storm by lowering the solids in plant #2. The plant handled a hydraulic load above capacity without permit violation.

#### **Executive Director's Report**

Mr. Fischer discussed the NJEIT Disaster Recovery Funding Program and the ability to acquire a 3 year bridge loan to cover the period from now until the FEMA dollars have been reimbursed. With FEMA at 75% the Authority will be responsible for 25%.

WHEREAS, these services will be limited to a 16 week period.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Commissioners of the Bayshore Regional Sewerage Authority approve the hiring of Bristol Protective Services as security services for the Authority for a 16 week period contingent upon Bristol Protection Service providing the necessary insurance, indemnification and hold harmless agreement, and proof of security officer certification with the Security Offices Registration Act.
